The officers and members of Greater Cincinnati Aquarium Society thank you for the opportunity to bid on the 2009 American Cichlid Association Annual Convention. The proposed dates for the meeting would be Thursday, July 27, through Sunday, August 1, 2009.

The Greater Cincinnati Area is very convenient to cichlid keepers, as it is within a short drive (less than five hours) for cichlid clubs in Michigan (Michigan Cichlid Association), Illinois (Greater Chicago Cichlid Association), and two clubs in Ohio (Great Lakes Cichlid Society and the Ohio Cichlid Association). In addition, several all-species clubs can be found in Indianapolis, Columbus, and Louisville, all within two hours of Cincinnati. Travel to Cincinnati is easy by plane or by car as we are only a 4 - 5 hour ride from Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit, and Milwaukee and within a one-day drive of the east coast. Delta Airlines, as well as other major carriers, provide service into Cincinnati's international airport.

The host club, Greater Cincinnati Aquarium Society, was founded in 1974 and hosted a very successful ACA annual convention in 2003 as well as in the 1980's. Our club has grown over the years with a membership over of 200 and an average attendance at our monthly meetings of over 70.

After a review of our proposal I am sure you will find the Cincinnati area a perfect location for the 2009 ACA convention.

Staffing

Convention Chairman

ACA BOT member Phil Benes, who is familiar with previous ACA conventions and was convention chairman for two previous conventions (1999, Detroit, and 2003, Cincinnati) is coordinating planning and organization. In addition, Phil has chaired the Water Wonderland Show committee, which was an annual, all species fish show in Detroit. Many members of GCAS are involved in the planning, organization, and administration of this show. In addition to GCAS, the Cincinnati area is home to several pet shops that have volunteered to help make this a successful convention for the ACA. About the GCAS

In 1974, a young doctor by the name of Dr. Charles Mendenhall moved to Cincinnati to work for the Veteran's Administration Hospital. Being a tropical fish hobbyist, he soon met up with Judy Herway, who at the time owned a fish store in Northern Kentucky, and Dave Morgan, who also was a cichlid lover. They decided to start a fish club and named it Greater Cincinnati Cichlid Association.

In the early 1980's it was decided to change the name of the club to its present name, Greater Cincinnati Aquarium Society, to include all tropical fish enthusiasts. Also in the early 80's, the Cincinnati club hosted the American Cichlid Association convention with the festivities being held at the Thomas More College and the participants staying at the Drawbridge Inn in Northern Kentucky.

Over the years we have had various activities including fish shows, auctions, picnics, tank tours, and Christmas parties. We have had nationally known speakers at our meetings such as Ad Konings, Dr. Wayne Leibel, Gary Lange, Jack Wattley, Dr. Paul Loiselle, Charlie Grimes, Rusty Wessel, and Dr. Peter Lewis, just to name a few.

Today we have one of the largest and most successful semiannual auctions in the country, averaging 900 bags of fish and/or plants. We are a tax exempt, nonprofit organization whose membership has grown from the original three to about 20 in the mid 70's to approximately 200 at present time.

As you can see, we've come a long way in the last 33 years. Our membership has grown, the auction has gotten bigger, and attendance at the meetings and Christmas parties has never been higher. Thanks to the foresight of our three founding members plus the work and dedication of all of our former and present officers and members, we have prospered and will continue to do so.

Site Study

Due to the size of the ACA convention, 4 suburban hotels were determined to be large enough to provide adequate space requirements to house this convention. These four were the Drawbridge Inn (Covington, KY), the Ramada (Springdale, OH), Kings Island Convention Center (Mason, OH) and the Sheraton, Cincinnati North (Sharonville, OH). All of these hotels could provide adequate guest rooms for the event and could offer sufficient space for the meetings, general sessions, show, and auction.

The hotel of choice to host the 2009 ACA convention is the Sheraton North Cincinnati (Sharonville) for the following reasons:

- Free parking
- Easy, walk-in access to cars
- Suburban location
- Indoor on-site water park
- Truck access to show for loading and unloading
- Alternate hotels within 10 -15 minutes
- Upscale shopping mall and a variety of eating establishments within a 5 minute drive
- All activities on one floor
- Simple, easy to follow layout for guests
- \$92/\$105 per night room charge for up to two occupants (\$5 for each additional guest)
- Outdoor pool
- Minutes off of I-75 for easy access

Speakers

Speakers are always one of the major draws for a convention. Specific individuals have not yet been contacted but a variety of speakers representing all parts of the cichlid hobby will be presented. It is expected to have nationally renowned experts speaking on the cichlids of Lake Malawi, Lake Tanganyika, Madagascar, and Central and South America.

Convention

GCAS recognizes that the final income for the convention will be directly proportional to the total attendance, so great care will be taken to assure only top quality speakers and workshop chairmen. With the quality of the program and rising costs for all services, the convention committee recommends a registration fee of \$40.00 per person. Payment of this fee will allow admittance to all presentations and will pre-register auction buyers and sellers. The auction on Sunday will be open to everyone. The GCAS reserves the right to waive the registration fee for Club members working a minimum number of hours for the convention.

Exhibitions

For the convention, GCAS has scheduled a nineteen class competitive exhibition of cichlids, four photography and art classes, and one natural aquarium class. First, second, and third place awards will be presented for each class. We will work closely with the BOT in determining the final structure of the classes. The exhibitions will be open to anyone who pays the entry fee of \$5.00 per entry and agrees to abide by the exhibition rules..

Banquet

A private banquet will be held Saturday evening at the hotel. A preliminary schedule includes dinner, presentation of the awards, and a speaker. A cash bar will be available for those guests interested. All dinner entrees include an appetizer, salad, vegetable, potato, rolls, dessert, and a beverage. There will be a choice of two entrees. The price will be approximately \$35.00 per person.

Auction

An all-cichlid auction will be held on Sunday with seating available for over 750. Entry will be free to all, however a \$5.00 registration fee will be charged to all sellers who did not register for the convention. The convention split is proposed to be 70/30, with the first \$1.00 and the remaining 30% going to the host club to be split 50/50 with the ACA.

Outings

Several outings have tentatively been scheduled and will be available on a prepaid, reserved basis:

Cincinnati Zoo – One of the premier zoos in the country.

Newport Aquarium and Newport-on-the-Levee - A behind the scenes tour of one of the nation's newest aquariums and an afternoon of shopping and dining in one of the area's newest entertainment complexes, which includes an Imax theater and Hofbrau Haus.

Paramount's Kings Island Amusement Park.

Cincinnati's Museum Center - Discover the Cincinnati History Museum, Cinergy Children's Museum, Museum of Natural History and Science, Cincinnati Historical Society Library, and the Robert D. Lindner Family OMNIMAX Theater.

Accommodations

The Sheraton is located in suburban Cincinnati and is only 30 minutes from the airport. A for fee airport shuttle bus will be available for the convenience of the attendees who arrive by air. This fine hotel has sufficient facilities to accommodate all convention requirements.

We have confirmed a rate of \$105.00 per night at the host hotel and a rate of \$92 at the Hamilton Hotel (a sister hotel located on the same site) for each room with occupancy up to 2 people in each room. There is a charge of \$5.00/night for each additional person after that. There is no charge for meeting and show space provided that we meet the minimum revenue expected by the hotel based on meeting a minimum of 640 room nights. Previous conventions, including 2003 in Cincinnati have well exceeded this minimum requirement. Additionally, a complimentary sleeping room will be provided for every 40 rooms booked.

The Sheraton offers facilities that meet or exceed the requirements as described in the ACA Convention Guidelines.

Events

A tentative schedule of events is presented below. This includes the required items listed in the ACA Convention guidelines and some other events to take advantage of the unique attractions the area offers.

In addition, GCAS stands ready as a very experienced and strong club (many of the 2003 volunteers are already committed to working the 2009 convention) to provide all the support necessary to assure a very successful show.
